

Purple Haze Guitar Tabs and Chords

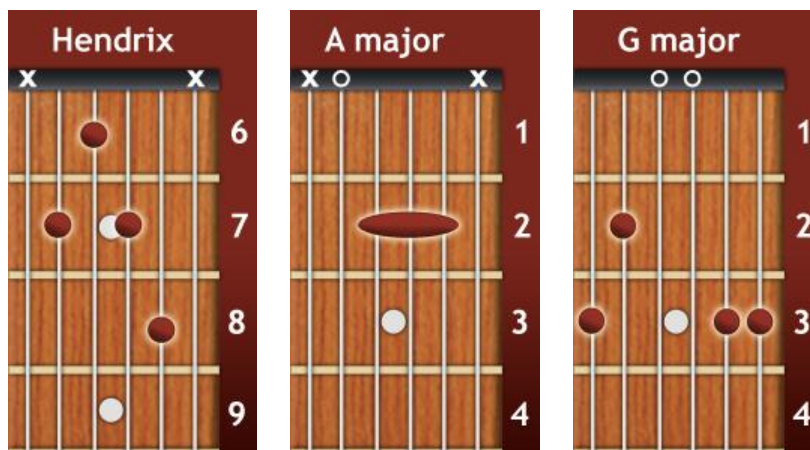

Chords

These are the chords you'll be using during Purple Haze. The Hendrix chord is in fact a dominant 7#9 chord in whichever key you are playing it. In the case of Purple Haze, the Hendrix chord is an E7#9.






Main Riff








More advanced strumming pattern





Simpler strumming pattern
